Good morning, good afternoon, good evening. Wherever you are out there in the world, it's time for us all to step out onto the Highwire. I just got back last night from Washington, DC, and I can say right now something I don't think I've ever thought I would say, which is big things are happening right now in Washington, DC. I was lucky enough to be right there in the Hubert Humphrey Building, the HHS building, to watch the incredible statements, first press conference by HHS secretary, and he focused it on autism. We're going to get into those details coming up. Also had some amazing meetings with brilliant people that are really trying to make a difference right now and take advantage of the opportunities that exist right here in the United States of America and what's taking place. But first, I want to make an announcement. We did something that we almost never, ever do, which was we bailed out of our release of the Peter Marks the real Peter Marks press conference was scheduled for yesterday, May 6th. We were going to put out the timeline and the full versions with, all of the interactions and things that we had put together yesterday, which is dynamic. We were ready to go, but we just decided with the announcement by Robert Kennedy Junior that we didn't want to interfere with that news cycle.

There's no reason to be competing. He's worked so hard to get there. So many of us have worked so hard to be in this situation. Let's really just let that story run its course. And next week, we're looking at next week. And I can tell you, I've got some Intel, some really big announcements coming next week too. So we're like, okay, let's just push it down. So we're going to do that release in early May. On May 6th, of course, is where we're, pushing that to. We believe that this story, is what we call evergreen. It is damning and powerful and incredible, but we wanted to get the attention that it deserves, especially by mainstream media. But that means it gives you more time to have everyone you know go back and watch last week's show where we really broke it down, the major sound bites that are in there. So many of you wrote in what a powerful show that was. Peter Marks just really is outed for the, the type of person he really is. Not the version we're seeing in mainstream media, but a great show.

We're really looking forward to that announcement. But again, you know, we got to be thinking about news cycles right now. And we really want the attention on the great work that's being done for the first time, inside of HHS. We're going to get to that in a little bit. But first a lot of times, you think of a movie, you think of all the people. Or then there's times where I grew up in, my dad would always say, what one man can do is change the world. Yeah. And, one of the things that's becoming very clear in the work that I'm doing is that what one warrior mom can do, is maybe more powerful than anything I've ever seen. And one warrior mom has achieved something in taking, of course, working with other great people, but has just delivered Idaho with the most, sweeping, comprehensive medical freedom bill has been signed that we have ever seen in this country. It's incredible. I'm talking about Leslie Manookian. And if you don't know who she is, just imagine if you were, representing your government. And this woman stepped up to the podium and had this to say.

Mr. chairman, Committee, my name is Leslie Manookian. I'm from Ketchum. Um, I run a nationally recognized nonprofit, but I'm here in my personal capacity as a concerned citizen of the state of Idaho. Growing up, I could have never, ever imagined that Idaho would become a place that locked its people down. Forced citizens to cover their faces, stand on floor markers six feet apart, or produce proof of vaccination in order to enter a venue or a business. But that is exactly what happened in the last five years. People lost their jobs, suffered isolation, mental health issues, were denied participation in normal society, and dozens even died. That's the statistics that we have, all on the basis of empty promises, if not outright dishonesty, from some members of our federal government. These are the reasons I'm here today, because I want Idaho to lead the nation in ensuring that such intrusions into our personal health decisions never occurs again. I truly believe that no right is more fundamental than the right to determine what we put into and on our bodies. Medical interventions. I mean, it should be something that is just obvious right on its face. If someone else can force us to do something to our bodies For someone else's benefit or for their concerns, then we're not truly free.

The Idaho Medical Freedom Act, sponsored by Senator Forman, would restore this ethical principle in Idaho and ensure that Idaho stands as a beacon of liberty in deciding, or in declaring that no individual will be coerced into receiving a medical intervention against their will. It ensures that employment, education, entertainment and public participation remain accessible to all, regardless of their medical choices. The United States Supreme Court has repeatedly upheld the American ideal that individuals have the right to make deeply held personal medical decisions without interference or coercion. The right to make one's own medical decisions is not granted by the government. It is not a privilege subject to approval. It is a sacred, God given, inalienable right woven into the very fabric of our constitutional Republic. I urge you, Mr. Chairman, and the Committee, to vote yes on s 1023 23. Medical freedom should not be a partizan issue. This is about the fundamental right of every individual to make medical decisions for themselves. If we fail to defend this principle now, what comes next? So I ask you all to let Idaho be that model. Let Idaho be the example, the shining light on the hill and vote yes on S 1023. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Committee.

As I said, it's one of the most comprehensive and sweeping bills. Let me just read you a couple of the statements. This is a multi-page document that is just filled end to end with power to the people. But "medical mandates prohibited. Section one, a business entity doing business in the state of Idaho, shall not refuse to provide any service product, admission to a venue or transportation to a person because that person has or has not received or used a medical intervention." Here's another section. Section four "a school operating in the state of business subject to chapter 11, title 39 Idaho Code operating the state shall not mandate a medical intervention for any person to attend, enter campus or buildings, or be employed subject to the requirements of the Idaho Parental Rights Act, section 32 1010." All of those numbers and "section 33 205 Idaho Code. For the purpose of this subsection, private and parochial schools shall be considered as having the same authority as school districts under section 33, five, 12." And then this section five, "unless required by federal law, no state, county, or local government entity or official in Idaho shall require any person to receive or use a medical intervention." This is an incredible victory. It was not an easy one. It's my honor and pleasure to be joined right now by Leslie Manookian. Leslie, first of all, congratulations to you and the incredible team around you that made this happen.

Thanks so much, Del. Yeah, thanks so much for having me on. And just watching that intro brought tears to my eyes. It's just incredible that that is actually now, you know, in law in the state of Idaho and paves the way for the rest of the country, I hope. It's it's just unbelievable how far we came. And I really want to say that my hats off to all the people who helped make this possible, because it was thousands and thousands of Idahoans contacting, um, the legislature, contacting the governor, in addition to my, um, fellow sisters in this fight, Miste Karlfeldt and Sarah Clendenin, and then the legislative people, I mean, the people in the House were incredible. Representative Rob Beiswenger and Representative Josh Tanner were really instrumental in making this happen.

I think when I first heard about this law, or in many of us just thought, Idaho already has the best. I think religious exemptions are strong there. I remember years ago saying Idaho basically just passed a law. You can write your exemption on a piece of toilet paper and it has to be accepted. I mean, it's like they're really pushing the envelope. What made you think that there was, another law needed. Why was this law needed in your mind? Where you felt like your exemptions were falling short there in Idaho?

Yeah. So? So, Del, you may recall that I made a documentary film on vaccines called The Greater Good many years ago. And that whole process of making that film, raising the money for it, really impressed upon me the imperative of medical freedom for all. And, um, that was just brought to, you know, back to me in sharp relief during Covid. I live in an area that is populated in large part by people from Los Angeles, San Francisco, New York, Seattle, D.C. and these people have brought their their, um, views with them, unfortunately. And it's kind of changed the, the shape, the, the state of the state. And what happened in Covid in my area was that you could not go to the Performing arts center, the event center. Without showing your papers. Please. You could not, um, work in a lot of places. The the gyms energy fired people who had been great employees for 20 years for not showing proof of the Covid shot or masking. You couldn't go to the Y, you couldn't go to restaurants. My own father was escorted out of the grocery store. My 82 year old father, this little man, um, who had a heart condition and wouldn't wear a mask for his, you know, obvious reasons, was escorted out of the grocery store by this six foot three man who said, we don't care about your exemptions. So people just completely lost their minds here in some areas in Idaho, in other areas, it was fine. They didn't go so overboard. Um, but I just felt that if there was any time to pass a law that extended to every person to ensure that every person is able to exercise the most basic and fundamental of human rights, the right to direct their own medical choices, then it's now. And so I took something that had already passed in Idaho, which was the Coronavirus Stop Act, and I rewrote it to extend to all medical interventions. Interventions and then pursued it. And I mean, I it's incredible that it happened.

When you say medical interventions, what's included in that? How do we understand what that term means in this bill.

Yeah. So it's extremely broad, which was one of the criticisms by the people who were opposing it. But it is any device, any test or diagnostic, any medication, any pill, any injection, any type of medical intervention, a mask, a vaccine, a chip, you know, these things are coming. Anything that is put into or on your body, or you're forced to use in order to live a normal life is prohibited. So it's it is really sweeping. I mean, this is landmark legislation.

It's fantastic. Do you think I mean, when we look at Covid, of course we talk about the negative part of that. We also all tend to talk about how much it woke people up. Do you feel like that was instrumental in being able to pass a bill like this? Do you think you would have been able to pull this off prior to Covid?

No. Absolutely not. I don't think we could have. Um, if you look back, I've been participating, going and presenting at the legislature and testifying for more than 15 years in the state of Idaho. And I think that there was a there's always been an appreciation for the importance of providing exemptions. So, as you mentioned, Idaho does have the very, very best medical exemption or rather, exemption to vaccines for school kids in the nation. You literally can oppose for any reason you want. You just write on a piece of paper. My child is exempt for religious or other reasons, signed Lesley J. Manoukian. And you submit that? That's good. So it already has that. But I think that we really lost our we lost our way and we have to come back to this place of what really matters. And I feel like the conversation had been, um, diverted away from just protecting children to now forcing entry into society on this stuff, and it needed to be redressed. So, um, that was really the genesis beside it. And what happened during Covid was we'd been talking about this stuff for 5 or 10 years. Covid really helped the legislature understand that we weren't just talking about nonsense, right? That we had been prepping them for years about these issues. And once there were some children kidnaped. So there was a baby in northern Idaho that was kidnaped by the hospital and Child Protective Services when the parents declined a hepatitis B vaccine at birth.

And that kind of woke people up. But Covid really woke people up. Covid helped. You know, there have been over 12,000 reports to bears of people injured or killed by the shots in Idaho. So this is a small state with only 2 million people. Everybody knows somebody. And so what's happened is I think that the legislature now fully understands why we've been pushing on this for so long, and now they really get it in a different way than they ever did. It's like a visceral thing now. And so they are on our side. I mean, we we won in the House 47 to 23. I mean, that's a staggering vote. And in the Senate, it was in the low 20s to I think there's 35 people. There were a few absences, but it was probably 21 to 14, something like that. And I mean, this is because they get it. People saw up close firsthand that people can be injured or killed by these things. That government lied. And this is the silver lining of Covid, right? We are all benefiting from this because now these legislators see the truth, which is that we have to make these choices for ourselves and that no one else should be in that position.

Part of this story and you and I, had an opportunity to meet up with some dynamic people in Washington, D.C., just the other day. But when you were telling the story and I think it's important for people to hear it. This was not an easy road, not from the beginning. And, not only pushing it through, but there's a moment where we all walked away thinking they lost it. The governor just vetoed. Even when you'd won the first time. Tell me a little bit about the journey of this bill, because your perseverance is amazing at a moment where everyone thought, oh, there you go. Same old, same old. You pulled through. But tell us, how did you, how did you launch it? What was the outcome? And then the journey that it took to get it all the way here?

Yeah. It was it was really, um, the biggest emotional roller coaster I've probably ever been on in my life. I, um, drafted the bill last summer. So in the summer of 2024, I think in July. And, um, the sponsor, Senator Dan Foreman, had told me, if you write the bill, I'd presented the idea to him in the summer. I said, I'll draft the bill and get it to you. And he said, if you like it or if he likes it, that he will sponsor it. And so I presented it to him. He thought it was terrific. He took it to the Legislative Services office in probably December of last year, and then he introduced it and got it printed in January of 2025. And then he invited me to come to Boise in February. And that was the footage that you showed. That was me actually presenting to the Idaho Senate State Affairs Committee. You know that that's a official proceeding of the Idaho Legislature. It was I who who presented the bill and then stood for questions afterwards. And I did the same thing in the House after it presented this, after it passed the Senate, I presented it to the House Health and Welfare Committee.

So basically what happened was the bill initially flew through the Senate, which was the highest hurdle for us, and then it flew through the House and and then it waited. We heard nothing. There was no comment from the governor, not a word about a concern. There was no contact from him. In fact, he was not even around. I mean, I was hearing that he had not come in for a few days prior to, um, the the due date on this bill. Basically, it got to his desk on a Monday morning at 1130, and he has five days from that exact time to sign it. So that was Saturday, March 29th at 1130. He had to sign it or veto it or do nothing. And if he did nothing, that it automatically, automatically became law. And what happened was like an hour before, hour and a half before the bill was to take effect, he vetoed it and he did something. Yeah. I mean, so I mean, I went.

From just that moment. Yeah. What was that moment like? I mean, after all of that work.

After all that work. I mean, literally, I lived three hours from Boise. I was back and forth, back and forth for the votes, for the presentations, going and spending the night over there. You know, we had people writing in and calling in. I mean, it was like really, um, intense couple of months to get this through. And, um, and all week long, we were hearing that the smartest people are saying that he's going to sign the bill. Everybody thought he was going to sign the bill. We didn't think he could possibly not sign it, because the political winds have changed so much in Idaho that the people want freedom, they want to be protected, and they don't want the egregious intrusions that happen during 2020 to 2025 to ever happen again. So we were really optimistic. So you can imagine I'm like sitting there visiting my son in Chicago who's in college, and I get a phone call from Senator Forman saying, well, I just got a call from the governor's office or from the governor, and he's vetoing our bill. And I was like, shocked because Forman had kept reassuring me he really thought that we were going to get it signed. And we had already had the mask mandate ban signed by the governor. We had already had the governor sign a bill that removed the power to do all things from the health districts and the state of Idaho. So we were pretty much on a roll here. And I thought, okay, this is good.

I was stunned. I was stunned, and I, I mean, I was so crestfallen, you can't even imagine it. But then we communicated over the weekend. I flew home to Idaho and he said, you know, listen, we have a plan. The governor issued a statement along with his veto, saying that his concern was that the bill, this this bill did not address whether or not schools could send home sick children. Well, the bill didn't address that because it was totally unnecessary. There's already existing code which says that sick children may be sent home, and we hadn't touched that. So from my perspective, this was a false you know, this was a fabrication. This was not a legitimate concern because we'd already, um, because we hadn't, you know, said anything about it. And so I thought, well, let's just call his bluff, let's insert the proper language and we'll do that. And so that's what we communicated about it on Monday morning. I was providing the exact language that was necessary to insert in the bill. And what happened was Senator Foreman went and met with the governor's staff. And over the course of that day, by about 2:00, he printed a new bill. And this new bill was basically the same as my original bill, but it now excluded all daycares.

Wow. So somehow the daycares got involved and. And so then what did you do then?

And Del it wasn't just like one, one word. There were six different definitions of daycares inserted into this bill. Legally, somebody wanted that in there, and I didn't understand it right away. But overnight everything came together and I realized what was going on. So Senator Foreman had assured me that he would not proceed without and change any language without approving it, you know, running it by me.

Um, he also had assured me that if I didn't like it, he would not proceed. Well, he took that bill, and he presented it in committee against my wishes.

I told him I thought the bill was evil, that I would not allow children to be sacrificed literally to be ransomed in order to purchase the freedom of adults. I could not stand by that. That I thought it was evil. And he did it anyway. So I was outraged. I'm truly outraged and couldn't believe what was happening. And he told me, oh, it's still a good bill. He finally called me that night late at night and said, it's still a good bill. And I said, no, it's not. It's awful. It's not a good bill. It's literally auctioning off our children. And I can't be part of that. But the people on the house side started texting me and saying, this isn't over. And, um, the next morning we were in communication and Representative Biswanger, who was the sponsor in the house. He said, don't worry, I'm talking with leadership in the House. We're going to bring our own bill. So they brought a new bill.

So Senator Forman introduced this bill, SB 1210, and then the House brought their own bill, HB 472 and four. 72 was identical to my original bill, but it inserted the language that the governor claimed to be his concern, which is that this legislation does not contravene the existing language that allows schools to send home sick kids. So we basically called it called his bluff. Yeah. And then what happened was it sailed through the house on Wednesday. They basically expedited it. This is the last week of the session, mind you. So this is crazy. I've never been involved with this kind of horse trading or this experience. And I mean, it was every 15 minutes we're being told this is going to happen. It's not going to happen. It goes it passes through the committee. Then, you know, Wednesday night we hear the Senate won't hear the bill. So I'm just like, we're just I mean, we I didn't sleep for two weeks essentially. I mean, it was just all night long we were texting. We're calling, we're strategizing. And then on Thursday, we heard that Senator Fuhrman was going to take he had gone to totally silent on all on me and our our whole team. We heard that he was going to remove the daycare exclusion. But I didn't trust him at this point because, you know, he had completely broken his word with me and so I didn't know what to do. So then we worked all day long to try and kill 1210 and to support for 72. And we were bombarding the, you know, the both chambers and the governor with these calls and these comments.

And then that night I am driving home from Boise through the mountains with no coverage calls falling. And I get a call, I get several calls from the speaker of the House and other leadership, and they're telling me, you know, what do you want to do? Do you want us to kill? It will kill the bill if you want us to kill the bill. And I was like, what do I do here? Do we kill the bill? Because I won't be part of sacrificing innocent children and their well-being? Or do we move forward? And I was I mean, talk about a crisis. It was just so heavy. And, um, we ended up being on the phone until very, very late that night, and we all said we would pray on it and sleep on it. And in the morning I woke up and I said, okay, I'm going to testify in favor of the bill, but I'm going to say that there are these major problems with it because it had imported language from the Idaho rules, which is what's promulgated by administrative agencies, the health department saying that, um, healthy, unvaccinated children could be excluded in the event of a disease outbreak, but there was no definition for disease or outbreak. And so I'm like, could kids who are healthy be excluded because someone else has pinkeye, because someone else has strep throat, because someone else has a cough or a cold? What is this going to do? And so I was prepared to do that.

And I texted, um, representative Josh Tanner, who's the assistant majority leader, and I said, can I have two minutes of your time? And he called and he said, this isn't over. This isn't over. We can still change this. He's like, you tell me what you want in the bill. And so I told him what my concerns were, and he's like, we'll insert language about that. So he inserted in the bill. And the thing is, it had already gone through the Senate. So now the House has the power to actually alter the bill and then force concurrence by the Senate. So it was like unbelievable, brilliant strategy by the leadership in the House. And so they inserted language that said that no healthy unvaccinated person can be excluded on the basis of their vaccination status. This is truly revolutionary. No state in the country has anything like that. And then we also inserted that no rules or regulations or code could be promulgated by any state agency which contradicted this bill, which means that even if the government issues an emergency, no state agency can actually implement it. So it's pretty much bulletproof. Del. So anyway, anyway, we waited all day long. I didn't know what would happen. The Senate finally said, okay, we concur. Senator Foreman agreed. And then we waited, literally pins and needles to find out whether or not the governor would sign it. And he did. I couldn't believe it. He did. I still I'm still pinching myself. I still can't believe that he actually signed.

Sounds like the bill is even stronger in the end, after having gone through being vetoed than it was to begin with. Which, I keep saying, this isn't obviously a religious show, but there are times where I really believe there's a there's a greater, mind at work and guiding us. And sometimes those difficulties is why I really wanted you to tell that story, because so often we give up, and really, it's, it's those moments where the the miracle happens and the divine happens. And this is what you posted. He signed the Idaho Medical Freedom Act is law. "Idaho is the freest state. Congrats and gratitude to my health freedom sisters at Liberty for ever." Um. Amazing story.

Del. So I just have to say something on that. Every every morning and every night I would get into bed and I would put my hands on my heart, and I would pray and meditate and I would I would be so emotional and so fearful, and I would just be told, trust, trust, trust. You know, you need to trust. Trust me. And I was just like, okay. And I mean, that was so hard to do. But all I can say is, whatever you believe in, um, there is some higher power, and all I can say is all the glory to the highest, because this was, um, there is no doubt that there was a divine hand in my mind in this entire episode. And I really, truly believe it's something I've tried to teach my son since he was very young. That you believe in what you do. You put one step in front of the other and you just believe. And if you are, I think, pursuing good. If you are doing good, all that is good. Who can argue that we should not have the right to choose our medical treatment? Like, how can you possibly argue against that? That is clearly good. Then then the you know, God, whatever you want to call it, will follow. And so I really, truly believe that this was because the mission was about what is right and what is just and what is good, and that our purpose was pure. And so everything orchestrated. We got something better than I could have ever imagined. I mean, to think that children can't be excluded anymore, and people can't be excluded anymore because they're not vaccinated. It's unreal.

Um, so yes. So I founded a nonprofit called Health Freedom Defense Fund. It's healthfreedomdefense.org Um, I just want to add this to, you know, this is one of those things there where it was just about belief. Um, when we filed the the the lawsuit to challenge the federal travel mask mandate in 2021, everyone said it couldn't be done except me. And I was just like to my attorneys know this is wrong. The federal agencies cannot promulgate rules that that impinge our health freedoms. They can't do that. These are reserved to the states. This is wrong. And so we filed suit. And I just never, never doubted. I just believed through the end that we would win and then we won. So anyway, health freedom defense.

Well that was pretty inspiring. I have to say. It's amazing what people can do when they just really put their heart and mind to it. What an incredible story. And what a victory in Idaho.

And this is one of those moments in my opinion. And what am I talking about? Well, just last week we had Robert F Kennedy Jr, amongst other people in Trump's cabinet. There was a cabinet meeting and he said this. Take a listen.

So following those statements, the autism epidemic in America has now become one of the largest stories in the nation. And Robert F Kennedy Jr used his first press conference as secretary of Health and Human Services to say this. Take a look.

There's an extreme risk for boys overall. The risk for boys of getting an autism diagnosis in this country is now one inch 20. And it's high in California, which has the best data collection. So it probably also reflects the national trend. 1 in 12 point five boys. One of the things that I think that we need to move away from today is this ideology that the autism prevalence increases, the relentless increases are simply artifacts of better diagnoses, better recognition or changing diagnostic criteria. If you look at table three of the ADM report, it's clear that the rates are real, that they are increasing in the last ten years year, which is the the beginning with the first one year by year, there is a steady, relentless increase because this, uh, this epidemic denial has become a feature in the in the mainstream media, and it's based on an industry canard. And obviously there are people who don't want us to look at environmental exposures. This is a preventable disease. We know it's an environmental exposure. It has to be genes do not cause epidemics. They can provide a vulnerability. You need an environmental toxin. And we're going to look at all the potential culprits. We're going to look at mold. We're going to look at food additives. We're going to look at pesticides. We're going to look at air and water and medicines. So you know we're going to look. We're going to look at ultrasound and we're going to look at all of them agnostically. We're going to find the potential exposures that increase during that time period. And then we're going to and we're going to we're going to see if there is a link to this to this injury.

That was I you know, Jefferey I was lucky enough to be sitting in the room. I was out there for a different meeting the day before on Tuesday, and we found out suddenly that they were going to be having this announcement. And, I had mixed emotions. One just incredible hope that we're finally, finally going to, and by the way, I've been since I made VAXXED, I, it just feels like every day is like, we are getting to the end of this journey, which is I, after making VAXXED wanted everyone in the world to know that this issue was happening with autism. He's being very general right now, which I think is the smart play and saying, let's look at I know he means it. We're going to look at every environmental toxin that's out there. But let's be clear, we don't go from 1 in 10,000 to 1 in 31 because of better diagnosis or, because, somehow we've expanded the criteria. In fact. And I'm so tired of that argument, by the way, of, what is it? Just in the last few years, we've gone from one inch 36 to 1in 31. What did doctors suddenly they're better diagnosing than they were a few years ago. Better than five years ago? Ten years. At what point can someone tell me at one point, we have figured out how to diagnose this completely because this is getting ridiculous. They've been making that argument now for about 15 years. But, as I sat there and just thought, how many HHS secretaries have stood at this podium right here and gaslit this country and gaslit the world over this issue, ignoring the fact, I mean, just the simple statement, this is an epidemic. Um. It seems so simple and yet was so dramatic. And just. We are clearly turning a corner. We are in a new world now. Um, just an incredible moment.

Yeah. And besides making this his center point and stepping out with his first press conference here. I mean, like you said, he officially ended the epidemic denial talking point and refocused the nation on the autism epidemic that's been growing rapidly over the last several decades. But what he also did, too, was he shifted the, the culprit out of of genetics. So blame really blaming the victim. It's your fault. You have bad genetics and, you know, kind of go away. We'll figure it out. And he put it towards external factors. And as he said they're external factors are industry. What industry. Well he's being he's being coy about it. Or maybe the science isn't done and he's saying the science will start to be done. But he's looking at every industry now. And that shifts the national focus to to that external industry. And just understand too, this doesn't stop at our borders. The world is watching what we're doing, what he's doing, and they will follow suit wherever this goes. And so let's look at he put he posted this on X right after that conference says "the autism epidemic has now reached a scale unprecedented in human history because it affects the young. The risks and costs of this crisis are a thousand times more threatening to our country than Covid 19. Autism is preventable, and it is unforgivable that we have not yet identified the underlying cause. We should have had these answers 20 years ago."

So the CDC put out their mMWR, that's their in-house science journal, and this was what he's talking about. This is the data backing up what his press conference was all about. This is the "prevalence and early identification of autism spectrum disorder."

They look at 16 sites monitoring sites in 2022. Now he mentioned his press conference. We're going to have real time reporting on this instead of two year lag. And he made a great point. He said, do we wait two years to address a measles epidemic or a Covid epidemic? He He said this is the same thing. So we go into this report and it says this. This is the results of this report. 16 sites "among children aged eight years in 2022. Autism spectrum disorder prevalence was 32.2 per 1000 children. That's one inch 31 across 16 sites range from 9.7in Texas Laredo to 53.1in California. Asd was 3.4 times as prevalent among boys than girls." And so I mean, we're talking about a 384% increase since the year 2000. And you go into this report and look at the chart. He's talking about California, which has some of the best data collection in the nation. And these are just all of the sites. So these are the prevalence in all the sites per 100,000. And you see there California way above 50. That is a major, major issue there. That brings it to about 12.5 per 100,000. So this is this is raw data. And he's approaching this really in a in a red alert. You know, four alarm. Fire away. As as it should have been approached for the last several decades. And what did we see from the media? Well, immediately after Trump's cabinet meeting, where he said the autism rate is now one inch 31. We had Peter Marks, the individual of a lot of controversy as of late. He went on Face the Nation and he had this to say. Take a listen.

Well, it's interesting because his agency, the FDA, they were responsible for licensing all of the vaccines. And as we can show here, we've shown this table a lot of times. This is an ICAN table. It's made the rounds. His agency, the FDA, is responsible for licensing these vaccines for routine injection into children. They were never licensed by the FDA based on a long term, placebo controlled trial that is most of the vaccines on the CDC's recommended schedule. So it's interesting.

Can you produce all of this data, this robust millions and millions of children you've studied, as Marks said, that show all the studies that show that vaccines do not cause autism for these vaccines in just the first six months of life, because, you know, people are pretty vulnerable. Well, what are those vaccines given the first six months of life? Well, there's three doses of DTaP, hep B, influenza type B, we have the pneumococcal and the ipol. That's the polio vaccine. And so CDC really when they came back to us with is they couldn't provide evidence of a single study involving those vaccines. And so that is where we're at right now that that's that robust safety science we keep hearing about. They can't even produce it. And so let's go to well at least they should have done some vaccinated versus unvaccinated studies. Are they looking at the kids now that this now it's in the fourth phase of testing. It's rolled out into the public. That's us. Are they looking at the kids that didn't get the shots and see who's healthier? Who's not healthier? Let's go to Colleen Boyle. She was the CDC's developmental disabilities director, kind of an important person when it comes to autism. She was being questioned during a hearing by Bill Posey years ago. Let's see what she had to say about that.

Yeah, we stand forever ready here to correct former correct former FDA employees when they try to pass misinformation as fact on the vaccine autism conversation. But it can get exhausting talking about studies that aren't there. So let's talk about some actual science and let's. And what am I talking about? Well, there's some actual science on this year's flu shot. Now, the flu season is still going on. This is a longer flu season than we've had in a very long time, which is an interesting conversation on its face. But this is Fox News. This is mainstream. Mainstream headlines being made here. "Flu vaccine linked to higher infections says early research." And this is again the Cleveland Clinic. We've reported a lot of the studies out of the Cleveland Clinic. And they did research on their employees, their their medical employees at that clinic who took the flu shot. And let's see what they had to say about this. They're talking about the "effectiveness of the influenza vaccine during this year's respiratory viral season." And they said "among 53,402 employees, 43,857, 82.1% had received the influenza vaccine. By the end of the study. Influenza occurred in 1079 or 2.02% during the study. The cumulative incidence of influenza was similar for the vaccinated and unvaccinated states early."

"But over the course of the study, the cumulative incidence of influenza increased more rapidly among the vaccinated than the unvaccinated." Well, that's not what you want. So let's go to the graph here. It shows what I'm talking about. And around there's both unvaccinated and vaccinated. And about 90 days out you see that blue line the vaccinated it starts to diverge. And that starts to have a runaway vaccination induced flu shot. I guess you'd call a flu virus. I guess you'd call it. So we go back to the study and it quotes this. It says "in an adjusted analysis they adjusted for age, sex, clinical, nursing, job, employment, location. The risk of influenza was significantly higher for the vaccinated compared to the unvaccinated state, yielding a calculated vaccine effectiveness of -26.9." That means you're 26.9% greater chance if you got the vaccine to get the flu virus respiratory virus. So what do they conclude? Well, not shockingly, "the study found that influenza vaccination of working age adults was associated with a higher risk of influenza during this year's 20 2425 season." That suggested the vaccine has not been effective in preventing influenza this season.

And Del, having a vaccine with low effectiveness. A flu vaccine with low effectiveness is not a major breaking story because they they guess the strain they get together, they guess the strain that may be prominent strain during the flu season before the flu season starts. And then they they basically ramp up production for this flu vaccine. So we've seen headlines like this out of Canada before. "Flu vaccine effectiveness study signals no protection this year in Canada." So it's been it's been as bad as 0%. But the fact that we're getting now negative efficacy 26.9%. It's very interesting. Now we have kind of a natural study here year ago to the day or to the to the month. The same Cleveland Clinic employees were studied looking at their Covid boosters. And I want to remind people, we covered this, this study at that time, it's the "effectiveness of the 2023 2024 formulation of the coronavirus disease 2019." So it goes in and it says this. They looked at all these employees at the Cleveland Clinic that got this vaccine. They said "consistent with similar findings in many prior studies, a higher number of prior vaccine doses was associated with a higher risk of Covid 19. The exact reason for this finding is not clear. It's possible that may be related to the fact that vaccine induced immunity is weaker than less durable than natural immunity." So here you have this phenomenon during Covid that all of a sudden, more boosters, more vaccines for Covid. Covid 19 means you're getting it more. You have negative efficacy. And now all of a sudden these same employees or some of these same employees are having negative efficacy in the flu shot. What's going on here? But the hotbed has shifted now from Idaho to really Florida. Florida is the hotbed, and it's not for vaccines at this point or medical freedom. In a way, it's for fluoridation and water fluoridation and the right not to really have a medicine in your water supply. And we look at this, this county map of, of Florida. And you can see most of the counties have voted out the fluoride in their water, except some of those in the southeastern portion, the bottom right corner. You see one of the big ones there, Miami Dade. It's the most populous county in Florida, the seventh most populous county in the United States. They have voted out their commissioners there have voted out an 8 to 2 vote to get Florida out of the water. This was a big story in the run up over the last week. But something happened. And when they voted that out, you saw headlines like this. The media was really trying to damage control this. "At least 900,000 Floridians have lost already lost access to fluoride in their water." I mean, another way to put that would be 900,000 Floridians now have a chance to avoid lowering their children's IQ. Lowering elderly hip fractures. Arthritis. Bone cancers.

She is the mayor of Miami-Dade. New York Times reporting new York Times "Miami Dade mayor vetoes plan to remove fluoride from drinking water" goes into the story that says "the Miami-Dade Board of County Commissioners, a nonpartisan body, approved the measure to ban fluoride on April 1st in an 8 to 2 vote, with three commissioners commissioners absent. Nine votes are needed to override the mayor's veto. If all 13 are present, and it is unclear whether there will be enough support. The next scheduled board meeting is on May 6th." So what was interesting that happened that kind of broke a lot of people's hearts that were really pushing for this. I really wanted this out of the water. But we have all of a sudden this this phenomenon, this decentralized quick reaction force came out of nowhere when this when word of this veto came down and you saw Surgeon General Joe Ladapo, he went to X and he posted this. He said, "I'll never understand how anyone feels entitled to add drugs to the water that other people drink. Give her office as the mayor a call or visit and just say no."

Then we have Governor Ron DeSantis. He amplified that message and he said this. "Say no to forced medication." Then all at the same time, kind of uncoordinated. Everyone just just went to this. We have the a county commissioner in Miami-Dade, Roberto Gonzalez. He went even a step further. He said, "by vetoing this bipartisan solution, our mayor acting like a typical politician, relying on Partizan pollsters and tired talking points while putting people's health at risk, especially pregnant women, infants, children and other vulnerable groups." So from the grassroots, from the people all the way to the leaders of the state, several leaders of the state are all coming together really to support this. We've never seen anything like this before. And what's interesting about this obviously that may that May 6th overturn of that veto is important. But the wave is sweeping so fast across Florida and the nation that there's already a bill. This is SB 700 in Florida that's making this headline "Florida moves closer to statewide fluoride band with strong Senate support." So this bill will it prohibits addition of non-water quality additives such as fluoride. Doesn't say fluoride in the bill, but it prohibits those additives to be put in water. So that's kind of like a backdoor. This thing is moving really fast through the state.

And if we go all the way to the national level from from Miami-Dade County, all the way to national level, the EPA has kind of been hamstrung. So under the Biden administration, last July, the EPA put out this press release, this announcement, and it was talking about the results of its fourth review of drinking water standards. And it basically said this. If you go into it, it says "EPA has decided that the that the fluoride MPD is not a candidate for revision at this time. In addition, the NP is National Toxicology Program has not made a final decision about the report's developmental neurotoxicity. Systemic Review Conclusions is not formally released a final report." So it's basically saying, because this national toxicity program didn't really release its final report yet, we're not going to really tinker with the standards, because that's kind of a big deal. Well, literally a month after they did that, it's almost like they raced to put that press release out because they knew that report was coming a month after they did that. These are the headlines that were made. This is August of 2024. People will remember we covered this. "Us agency links high fluoride exposure to lower IQ in kids." That was the bombshell report that kicked all of this off really. And now the EPA has has a right to do this.

They must do this. This is Lee Zeldin, the head of the EPA. They put out a press release and they said this "EPA will expeditiously review new science on fluoride in drinking water." So they are moving on this. It says "the National Toxicology Program released a report in August of 2024, concluding with moderate confidence that fluoride exposure above 1.5mg/l is associated with lower IQ in children. The report also concluded that more research is needed to better understand if there are health risks associated with exposure to lower fluoride," so they go on to say that they're committed to do this, they're going to do it fast, and they're going to change the EPA's fluoride drinking water standard. If they find that this science is really working now. This is that the that the national level we have Arkansas, Georgia, Nebraska, Kentucky, Tennessee, they have all filed bills to either ban or end the mandates to require fluoride get it out of their public water supply. So this conversation is, curtains are almost drawn on this. And it's really interesting to report on this. It's really it's cool to be here to report on this because I think in the next six months we're going to see just massive change to this conversation.

Uh, we have total transparency that we hand to you. No other network does that. But the biggest difference is, as I say, at the top of every show, we don't have a sponsor. Our sponsor is you. It's, um. Luckily, I will say I'm very curious about all of that, so I enjoy. I enjoy learning it.

Meaning she isn't looking to tell you the truth. She's only going to tell you and admit what you can prove. Right. And so you have to show a witness that you can't lie to me. Um, and that does take a lot of prep work. Like before these depositions, uh, we pull every single study that they've ever authored. So with Plotkin was about 800 studies. We pulled every single one. Um, and we looked at all of them. I looked at all of them for the most part. And Edwards too, we looked at all the chapters of textbooks that they've written, or maybe they've been editors of us, and we look at all the videos that are publicly out there, anything that they've done. Um, you know, at one point in Kathryn Edwards deposition, we happened. She posted a she did interviews from her office so we could see the wall in her office and what she, uh, put on her wall. She's got this quote. And so in the middle of deposition, I just randomly said the quote, and you could see her face like that's in the wall of my office, like, as if I snuck into her office. No, I just was on a video, you know.

Yeah, and it's important. So I, um, I thought it made sense to make sure this reaches as many people as possible. Under the federal regulations, the secretary of HHS happens to be a Robert F Kennedy Jr at the moment. And I'll just read the statute. It says "they may review a determination under this section," meaning that's the CICP that's the program that decides whether or not somebody injured by a Covid vaccine can earn compensation "at any time on the Secretary's own motion or on application." What that means is that Mr. Kennedy, as a secretary of HHS, can review prior denials of compensation for those injured by Covid 19 vaccines. So there have been about 4000 denials issued by the Cicp. That's the counter injury compensation program with regards to people injured by the Covid 19 vaccine. And ICAN, as you know, generously launching an initiative for us, our firm, to gather those denials along with a form we're going to be making available very, very soon. Um, and we're going to be submitting them to the Secretary's office to review those denials of compensation. Um, and this time do so fairly. Um, which we trust is now, uh, a potential. Um, and so obviously we want to reach all 4000 of those individuals. And the reason that's critical is this. While we currently do have two lawsuits pending, also supported by ICAN, to strike down the immunity under the Prep act for Covid 19 vaccines with regards to injuries caused by those products.

We are also simultaneously seeking to push to have that repealed by the Secretary as well. And then and this is being done by ICAN legislate so not, not not ICAN. Uh we are pushing a bill so we're, we're coming at it three different ways to get rid of the immunity. But if any of those three different ways prevail, that probably will only impact in people in injured going forward. It will probably it depends. Obviously we're going to try to make it retroactive, but it could only there's a good chance it will only apply going forward. So anybody who has been injured by Covid 19 vaccine might only be left with the recourse of having filed in that, uh, I certainly won't call it a court. And I don't even think you can validly call it a program. It's a hole in the wall, uh, that you shove a piece of paper through but the whole. But the hope is that, um, they're reviewing the secretary's office. These folks will get a fair shot. And maybe the only opportunity to get compensation. And some of these folks that you've had them on your show. I mean, you know, they're trying to support their families. They're, you know, the person injured might be the only person bringing an income in, and now they can't work. Yeah. And they can't pay their medical bills. They're facing bankruptcy. The inability to support the family, inability to care for themselves or their family. They're devastating stories.

And of course, you know, we covered a huge story last week with the Peter Marks, secret videos that you worked with Brianne Dressen to bring forward. We're going to be releasing those in early May, and you and I are going to do a press conference with Brianne on that, but it's a perfect example. This person that was lying to the world, saying there was no signals of injury, was having meetings where we now know he was getting plenty of signals, thousands of people being represented and just looking the other way. Things like Maddie DeGaray. He knows for a fact that Pfizer said what she had was a stomach ache. When we see her, she's in a wheelchair with a feeding tube. Hardly, you know, a stomach ache. And it didn't affect him at all. Did it change his language? Didn't change his energy, didn't even change how he treated Maddie DeGaray. So all of these things are starting to come together and create this very important picture, as you said. So let me get this straight. We're pushing to end the protections of the Covid vaccine and strike those down. We're looking right now in this moment to get compensation, or at least a reevaluation of the 4000 people that were turned down.

And, you remind me how big your staff is and how many people work on this because I want people to recognize this isn't, we are this is going to cost money. We need help here. I want people to help us get this done. I want to be able to fund you to do this. But how many people are actually working on all these initiatives right now?

Yeah. I can't do what I do without the incredible, uh, group of attorneys and other professionals at my firm that work on ICAN matters. You know, on any given month, there's at least 40 people at this firm, uh, that work on ICAN related matters of one form or another, sometimes more. Now, the good part about it, we've talked about it in the past is that because we, uh, we we. I guess you could call it a repeat player, right? We've got, uh, we don't just do one foia litigation. We've got a hundred of them. So we're very adept at that. And we have an institutional knowledge within the firm with regards to these products. So we don't have to learn things from scratch. Right. And so we can handle an incredible volume of lawsuits, petitions, requests. Um, and so forth around, um, medical freedom, around assuring individual and civil rights with regards to these products, as well as exposing truths with with regards to these products to help secure individual and civil rights. Um, but by and so, uh, you know, we're very fortunate to have ICAN support that. I'll add one thing to it, which is that I think the most important time to to push is when you have the advantage. And, um, right now with the change in leadership over at HHS, if we want things, we, the public want things accomplished within their within the within the HHS, within various agencies. We can't just sit back and hope it happens. In fact, oftentimes, um, government officials need some petition.

They need a request. They need a demand to react to in order to effectuate the change. Even if they want to do it of their own initiative, they might be hamstrung to do so without a petition. You know, the FDA, for example, it typically acts in response to petitions. So Pfizer wanted to license a new vaccine. It doesn't sit at home and go, hey, you know what? We want a new vaccine license. And just we'll just wait for the FDA to do it. We're not going to petition them. We're not going to send them data. Of course not. If Pfizer wants a vaccine licensed, they have to send a formal petition to the FDA, support it, and so forth. If we want to ask for FDA action with regards to a particular vaccine, we have to do the same thing. We can't just sit back and hope the FDA is going to act. We can't sit back and hope these agencies are going to go do these things, even if the leadership is now more inclined to do so as as pro-vaccine, as FDA commissioners have been in the past. They don't go and make their own vaccines. They don't they don't, you know, they don't go, do they don't go start these processes on their own. They need a petition, often a request to react to, just like here, these 4000 individuals were denied compensation. Um, I would, you know, most likely if we want to get a reaction from the HHS in potentially reevaluating, we got to resubmit the petitions, the denials, with more with support and so forth.

Um, to be able to to get that relief for those individuals. Um, so it really is it's a critical time. It's probably the the best time ever and the most important time to push as hard as we can. I would say that, um, there's more work right now to get to, to, to do at the federal level and, uh, than ever in the history of what ICAN has supported. It is also the time where we probably and hopefully can get the most accomplished. So let's press our advantage to the extent that we have one second. It's also the time where we have the most amount of work to do in one of the states. Blue probably. Maybe without. I don't want to make this legal, but it's one of the colors. It's blue or red. I'll let people guess which one it is. Okay, one of them is going even more so, so to speak in the other direction in reaction to what they see going on at the federal level. And they are, and we have to work now twice as hard to make sure that they don't infringe on individual and civil rights in the states and not just do that. But obviously we're trying to free the five. We're trying to pull back and recapture rights in an environment that's even more hostile to doing so.

The CDC basically has paid we the taxpayers paid to gather the health codes and vaccine information from 10 million Americans, from various HMOs, from Kaiser to Harvard, Pilgrim to Henry Ford. And they aggregated it so you can do vaccine safety studies. We know there were thousands of completely unvaccinated kids in that database, and all we wanted to do all these years is compare the unvaccinated kids health outcomes across all everything, you know, neurological issues, everything to vaccinated kids one or more vaccines, it would have been simple to do it. We've been demanding it forever. Even the Institute of Medicine said it's possible. And now we have found out. I have just found out that, in fact, you can't get the VSD data anymore because what our the CDC has done is it essentially took all that data and returned it to each of the HMOs to make it unavailable so that they thwart the ability for.

And in the second round he did fantastic. The first set he won six two. He was looking amazing. I saw even other coaches coming in and saying, wow, look at this kid. And then as he came out for the second set, I saw him relax a little bit. You ever seen your kid do this? He just kind of came out, started coasting, let this kid back in. You know, that kid ended up winning that set and then ultimately winning the tie break and Ever was out of state.

We've got, you know, we've got Djokovic here in Aaron Siri playing tennis for us right now. I want him at his best. I want to keep saying go, move forward, and I want to point something else out that might have just gone right past you. Almost every other nonprofit will see a lawsuit going and jump in and say, oh, well, we'll fund that, which is great. But a lot of times that's the first time that lawyer has ever touched a vaccine issue or touched a medical freedom issue, and they're dabbling into it and they go and they fund that.

This law firm is designed to do this work now, and we are funding this work right now. We've won against NIH, CDC, FDA, HHS and a whole host. We brought back the religious exemption in Mississippi. We were critical because of our lawsuits. The religious exemption has been returned to West Virginia. We won back the California University school systems religious exemption. We want the elementary schools and we want to make California look like Idaho. We need your help right now. So please, right now, if you can, \$25 for 2025. I know I'm hitting it hard, but you don't know how much we're trying to do. And the honest truth is, is we're thin right now and we shouldn't be. Don't think this is over. Help us put the pedal to the metal, take no prisoners and bring this entire issue home, not just for this year.

This has nothing to do with us. Whatever our previous lives were as actors or celebrities or whatever it's called. This is the way of the future, and this is how we basically solve an enormous amount of our problems. And it's like, yes, here we go.

What, uh, what first got you involved in the regenerative farming space? Why, of all the things that grabbed your attention, as you're saying, you believe this is the most important issue. Why? What was it that that really got you into it?

I had a very amazing split sort of duality growing up. I had a Mississippi farmer redneck of a mom with an amazing lineage of half Irish, half Choctaw native. So I got a lot of that indigenous nature, um, information and then a lot of the farming, uh, nature from the Irish side as well. My dad's half French, half English, uh, Cajun. They're called coonass, you know. But I grew up on the bayous of southeast Louisiana. So my father teaching me of the delicate nature of the ecosystem as far as the wetlands. My mother and my mother's family teaching me about how farms, the way they feed one another, all of those systems in a regenerative way. You know, these are multi, multi, multi generations going back to the 1700s. So those two elements really informed who I would become. Josh Tickell and I actually went to the same high school in Mandeville Louisiana. Mandeville High School. Uh and it wasn't until 2007 that I got hooked back up with Josh and Rebecca. Actually, they were shooting fuel and the whole world just sort of opened up. Um, and through a lot of my work, I ended up meeting Allan Savory. You know, the godfather of of soil, uh, at a symposium I was speaking at in La Jolla. He had just won the Buckminster Fuller Award. And I met the man. I met the man. The guy who understands soil more than anyone. And he'd been saying it since 1973. Anyway, long and short of it is, he invites me out to Victoria Falls to his his place out there.

But we literally went on on this pilgrimage to Zimbabwe. And I saw for the first time what large scale regenerative agriculture actually creates. It's how you regenerate a desert planet. And I saw it and then it started to click the tens, hundreds of billions of dollars that can be saved and generated by just using regenerative AG, because you're cutting out all those expensive inputs with the high use of synthetics. And it all clicked. And now here we are. You know, that was dude. That was April of 2011. We were shooting that that was 14 years ago. So so this has been a part of our journey for a long time. And it took us seven years to make Kiss the Ground, seven years to make that film. So this team, Josh and Rebecca have put together these stories with this team and this now common ground coming out. And we're so grateful to Jeff Bezos and this entire team at Amazon. This is going to change the whole landscape of our agricultural economy. It's actually going to balance our climate, build \$100 billion a year, robust agricultural economy in the US, right? Start re-injecting that money back into middle America. It's the reindustrialisation of middle America. This is the future. And I'm like, I can't believe it's here. Like, I'm I'm emotional about it because I can't believe we're actually here. We're five days out and I'm taught this, you know.

Fantastic. Yeah. World premiere happening on Amazon Prime. April 22nd. It's a huge deal. What? You know, which is Earth Day, to remind everybody. One of the things that I really like about this conversation is something that, Doctor Zach Bush brought to my attention years ago, uh, which, you know, the climate change is such a trigger point from two different perspectives, it feels like half this country believes it's happening, or that at least that is caused by, you know, mankind. The other half, you know, saying that they don't believe in it. But what Zack pointed out is that this is a space where you want to talk about common ground. This is where we really make common ground because both sides want healthier food. Both sides recognize that things like glyphosate and these herbicides and pesticides are cannot be healthy for us. But what we need to both recognize is that if we really, whether we believe it or not, or it's man made or it's not the CO2 that is absorbed by the earth, if we could bring our farms back to life, the dirt, the soil that we've killed, which is so clear with all this industrial farming, if that soil came back to life, not only does it make our vegetables more vibrant, with more vitamins and things, you know, nutrients in them, but it also is, as Zach put it, the lungs of the Earth. You open up the lungs of the Earth so that we don't have to destroy necessarily our economy. We don't have to shut down every industry we have, which is where this argument is coming. Let's open up the lungs of the earth and get back to living life, you know? And it just seems like it's a great meeting place where we can all come together. Um, so, yeah.

Well, I mean, obviously China is not a developing nation, but you can't tell the developing world to not do what we did. So let's solve for that. Stop bludgeoning each other and trying to stop our industries. Let's eat all that carbon. And man, I'll tell you, when you look at these models and you look at the carbon models and you look at the new climate models based on what we're doing, it's unbelievable. We can just eat all that carbon. And you know what's amazing? Because you're right. When you mention the word climate change, whether you believe it or not, it actually doesn't matter because it's still going to it's going to affect us all right. But if you mention climate change to people, it doesn't matter what side of the political aisle they're on. People do this because it's such an enormous thought. So rather than this, we want people to do this. And when you show them what large scale regenerative agriculture can do by just like Zac was saying, the the lungs of the, you know, of the Earth just got to think about it.

We are the same biological process, right? The soil and its ability to sequester enormous amounts of carbon and feed us nutrient dense food. Right. We've lost 60% of our topsoil and 60% of our nutrients since the end of World War two. That's not a that's not, uh, it's no accident, right? Yeah. But that soil just like us, that soils ability to sequester and grow food is only as good or capable as the health of soil is directly related to the microbiome of that soil. So the health of the microbiome of soil, that soil health is dependent on that as the same biological process as human beings, the health of a human being is directly related to the health of the gut microbiome. We are the same. So when we when we kill those microbial and we kill those fungal networks within the soil by tilling, we kill its ability to to share nutrients and sequester carbon, Right when we stopped doing that, we start fixing that nitrogen in, like Doctor George Carver said taught us so many years ago. Everything changes. Think about this. \$400 an acre up to savings, right? You got guys like Rick Clark in western Indiana and Gabe Brown. These guys, these guys are making a ton of money.

Like, look, man, I make whiskey, right? A lot of whiskey. I make vitamins, too, but just grain acre. Say, there's 200 million grain acres, right? You multiply \$400 times 200 million. It's \$80 billion a year that we are of farmers money that we are sending to to to foreign countries, because that's where the agrochemical companies are owned. Why are we doing that? So when we stop doing that, all that money starts going back into the system, right? And as our our soil health goes up, our human health is going to go up. But what happens when human health goes up? Our human Our health care costs come down precipitously. So now you're like, here we go, man. Farmers are making more money. They're paying more taxes. School districts are going to get better. Water districts are going to get better. After school programs are going to be implemented. I mean, this is a really big, positive cascade. And man, it is actually happening whether you want it to or not, whether you believe in climate change or not, it doesn't matter. Let's give our economy and our health the boost that it needs. This is the surefire way to do it. Everyone wins, except the agrochemical companies are going to have to find other revenue models, and that's just what's going to happen. You know.

What do you say to those farmers? There is real panic all the way to the point where in Georgia right now, the governor is about to sign a liability protection for Monsanto. So you can't sue them if glyphosate, ends up giving you cancer or things like that. And they're using the argument we're protecting the farmers. So this this potential war on farmers, which is what this could be turned into. How do you want to address that? What do you say to that?

And so the best thing that we can do is utilize the government as well to actually stop subsidizing these ridiculous warm weather crops and grains and stuff that we don't actually need to because we're building putting them into a food system that's toxic. We're subsidizing the unhealth of our nation. When the office of the president or the legislators allow that farm bill to change a bit, and we start actually helping farmers transition, right. Because, listen, farmers only want to talk to farmers. They only trust farmers. And by the way, I don't blame them. I don't blame them at all. But right now, if you look at how much a farmer gets of \$1, it's about \$0.08.

That's not fair. Yeah. \$0.08. So everything else goes to the agrochemical companies, the seed patents, the seeds, all of that stuff. When you take away the reason Rick Clark saves \$2 million a year in western Indiana is he doesn't use pesticides, fungicides, herbicides, fertilizer. And the big one is the amount of diesel that you need to distribute all of those synthetics around your farm. When you start taking that away, all of a sudden it's cash in your pocket. And so I'm not trying to sound crass or, you know, incendiary, but look, money talks, BS walks, the money talks. When you tell a farmer you can make more money and be healthier. You can't take that away from them once they hear that, they're not going back. And so we're happy to announce actually next week people say, well, how far have you gotten? Right. So we started this in 2020. Uh, we launched Kiss the Ground, which again, remember, the film took us seven years to make. There was about 5 million acres of organic in the US, which took about a half century to create. We're announcing next week we are at 50 million acres now of regenerative AG. Not all of it's transitioned. It's in different layers of transition. Uh, there's several tiers, but the farmers are doing it, the commitments are there, and it's already in the works. This is a sea change, and it's about halfway through to our goal of 100 million acres, because basically it's about 10% of the US farmed land.

So that means so right now that's going to mean one in all 1 in 10 calories you're eating came from regenerative farm. That means one out of ten farmers that are at the gas stations, the truck stops, the feed bins, you know, the feed stores, um, the agrochemical, uh, offices. 1 in 10 is talking about this now, right? That's a big difference. Yeah. And so the amount of money that we can inject back into the system is so incredible. And you got to think about, you know, we spent \$447 billion in diabetes, which is effectively a made up disease because of a toxic food system. Right. We're subsidizing corn. We're making all these sweeteners. It's destroying our country, right? Well, listen, once we take that out, all of a sudden human health goes up, mental health goes up, people have more money. Those farmers are going to the local, you know, Chevy dealership and Ford dealership. They're buying new trucks. They're taking their wives and their kids to dinner once a week, not once a month. You can't take that away from people for this amount of time. You know, what we learned was on the film. I mean, I'm not trying to laugh, but it's just what we do is we uncover on film how the agrochemical companies have been secretly micro-financing the land, not just the land grant universities, but the university agricultural curriculum in this country for 40 years.

This is the story of how when we put our minds and our hearts to it, and we expose the money coming from the agrochemical companies financing all the university agricultural curriculum, we have conditioned our country to think this is how we're supposed to operate. So much so that we've got, you know, a company that makes the product that gets you sick. Then they also sell the only cure available in the world for that. That is a wonderful closed loop, uh, economy for them. And hey, kudos. You did it. You're crushing it. It's time for that to end.
