Well, thank you, everybody for being here this morning. I want to thank CPAC for hosting this very important conversation. A lot of people want to just say COVID's in the rearview mirror. We've moved on. I don't want to talk about it. Do we need to talk about it?

I think we absolutely have to talk about it. Also, I think we have to say there's no such thing as the science. Remember that terrible term.

When we think about freedom? What other thing has ever happened in the world where every single nation worked in lockstep against its own citizens and took away their rights? Some of the people I have on this panel today are those that really did stand up during Covid. Doctor Laszlo Boros, what is your opinion about the safety of the Covid vaccine that was injected into the entire world?

In my 25 years of working on RNA, as well as other metabolites, what we learned is that if you want to do anything with RNA, you shouldn't modify it, you shouldn't stabilize it, and you shouldn't inject it. They did all of that. If you ask me as a medical biochemist, it's beyond a disaster.

When did medicine become this top down bureaucracy that decides what's working versus the doctor. Why were they stopping doctors that were claiming to have results and having answers?

People don't know and understand that the European Medicine Agency is actually funded by the pharmaceutical companies. There was also by the EU, formed the Hera, which is the Health Emergency Preparedness and Response Agency, and this agency gets €30 billion per year. And it doesn't have to show proof where the money goes, actually.

What should we have learned from the Covid experience?

We need transparency. If they will give us transparency, give us the data, have independent scientists as ourselves. For myself, so we could look at the data. The problem is that it has been manipulation and propaganda. And like scientists, independent scientists haven't been heard.

Thank you very much. It was a really powerful panel there at CPAC. I want to thank that panel that many of them flew in at the very last minute. It was a sort of a sort of a late arrival there, Doctor Maria Hubmer-Mogg and Doctor Laszlo Boros. We also had Vibeke Manniche and Alan Miller, who ran a great organization called Together Declaration that really stopped the Covid mandate from happening in the U.K. so just a great panel, great event. I want to thank Matt Schlapp and his beautiful wife, Mercedes. He's the chairman of CPAC. And and his wife, Mercedes did a powerful panel on the grooming gang. So it was just really overall a fantastic experience. And then I ran into Liz Truss, who, you know, we apparently she's aware of the work that we've been doing and we hit it off there. So it's amazing to see, you know, former prime ministers even. There was a potential prime minister from **Australia. They're very interested in the topic of medical freedom and much awareness there of the work that we've been doing. Alright. Well, **for the viewers out there and you and I, if you use social media, you probably understood that eventually your data is being tracked and sold, and that gives these companies** valuation. But something's happened slowly but now, very quickly throughout the rest of our neighborhoods and our streets, that surveillance has now moved to the physical on lampposts and light poles all around our cities. And over the last couple of weeks, it seems like a fever pitch has been hit all over the news. People are pushing back against something called flock. Cameras, flock surveillance, and it looks like this.

Flock cameras are back on the news.

I would like to ask for an immediate removal of the cameras and for the contracts to be canceled as soon as possible.

Your community is telling you that we don't want this.

The cameras captured the back of vehicles. Plates make model, color even unique details.

They record the information about the car, including where it is and when it was there, and then they put it into a database. And this is where it gets really scary.

And then an AI algorithm catalogs the make model, color, license plate number, bumper stickers, and even scratches.

Critics argue the cameras have created a mass surveillance network.

I think it should be a wake up call for all of us about the vulnerability of the technology that is being used to scoop up our data.

No more automated license plate readers of any brand. This technology is anti-democratic.

This is an invasion of privacy. It is an invasion of privacy without probable cause. The government doesn't have the right to search you unless it has a really good reason.

Not as a, in my opinion, a very un-American take on privacy and the way that we engage in criminal justice enforcement.

This this issue. Jefferey you're really now stepping on my last nerve? It freaks me out that we are here. I was reporting on the potential for facial recognition cameras back when I was on the doctors over ten years ago, and now we are literally facing this reality.

And it's interesting because the public has been primed. I mean, the books by George Orwell, 1984, all of these, all the dystopian movies, we've we've seen this coming, but a lot of people are saying, well, it's here now. And if you believed in informed consent and bodily autonomy, like I would imagine most of this audience does. You've seen this coming. This is not a stranger to you. Because we were ahead of the game when the vaccine passports came out during Covid, that was the first digital asset that tracked people's movements and allowed them to go in or kept them out of venues and locations and pubs and stadiums. And it was so good. Even though COVID's over. The W.H.O. said this, it adopted the European style Covid 19 vaccine passports as part of the new global Digital Health certificate, because I guess they were so good. We're going to keep using them. But throughout, as you saw in that news montage, throughout cities and towns, people are going to their boards, they're protesting, they're trying to stop these cameras, these flock cameras. They're trying to get them out of the cities. And in Syracuse, New York, it worked. Here's the headline here. Flock safety removes its license plate. Readers finalizing eight month breakup with City of Syracuse. But there's only one problem with that. Just a little bit after that headline, the same news outlet had to report this. Syracuse lawmakers approve contract with axon license plate readers plan to block flock safety from city streets. What's axon? Well, here's their promotional video. Take a look.

This is what's so scary. It's a lot of what I've been talking about as I'm traveling the world saying we are just seconds away from the, you know, living in an open air prison if we don't do something. And it's a lot of it's commerce, right? It's not even our governments. It's that Silicon Valley companies, they just see a future. They know this is where it's going. And they're competing to make it cheaper, faster in order to surveil us. And I just I think when I look at these companies, don't you have kids? Are you literally just going to sell your children into an open air prison so that you can make a dollar to do what? To live in that prison with your kids? It's really incredible. And, you know, I'm glad there's people, you know, finally recognizing and starting to push back on this.

And you can see here, I guess like shark teeth, there's company after company after company rushing into this space because that's where the money is in surveillance. And people can and should be protesting at their local city councils and trying to change this at the local level. But perhaps the only remedy to this may be, you know, that barbaric relic of the Constitution. And this is an investigative article, article here talking about the Fourth Amendment. So it's saying the Fourth Amendment is being liquidated by subscription, talking about these these private surveillance companies that offering subscriptions to cities, towns, police departments, and their goal is to scale as fast as possible and build these out. That's why these flock cameras just came out of nowhere. I mean, you can't get the roads fixed. It's impossible to do that. They don't have money to fix the roads in your town, but they can build these out behind everyone's back and all of a sudden they're all here. And in this article, it says this. Instead of beginning with an identified crime and gathering evidence about a particular suspect, flock created a system in which the movements of thousands of innocent people could be collected, continuously stored and searched after an investigation began. Flock expanded beyond subdivisions into apartment complexes, schools, hospitals, retailers, corporate campuses and municipal roads. The company now markets interconnected cameras, audio, drone and investigative systems to police agencies, businesses, and private community communities. This architecture allows privately owned cameras to become nodes in a law enforcement network. So that's right.

Even your schools, your your local supermarket, they're surveilling, they they become part of this subscription for safety. And now flock, um, basically integrates all of that for the police. And it's always running. They're always filming. That's what's happening right now. So something happened in the Supreme Court, a long awaited decision. This is Reuters looking at digital surveillance. It says every phone leaves a trail. Supreme court holds location. Data is protected by the Fourth Amendment. Now, this is not FLoC data, but this is your cell phone data. Remember, this was used during Covid to track people. And this is what the Reuters article says about this Supreme Court decision, Justice Elena Kagan wrote, writing the five justice majority concluded that, quote, location history data generated by smartphones receives Fourth Amendment protection because it provides an extraordinarily detailed record of an individual's movements. The court characterized this capability as a virtual panopticon. That's what the Supreme Court justices called it, that could be used by the government to scrutinize its citizens activities and provide an intimate window into a person's life. So it would be it wouldn't be a it's a hop, skip and a jump to think that these flock cameras would also fall underneath that because of that constant surveillance into people's intimate lives. It's not just one picture they're grabbing. They're grabbing all location details of people's private travel, their their private details of their life. This is what's going on across America. And again, companies are rushing in to, to secure this space as as market share.

And when you think about it, Jefferey, one of the things that I felt was a protection was you just never have enough manpower to go through like millions of hours of footage of cars driving by. But now with AI and, you know, the ability for computers to be tracking this, and if they're building data, that's what the data centers are for, is to just allow these machines to start creating algorithms to follow us and to predict what we're doing next. It's really, you know, we're, as I said, wake up everybody. It's, it's, it's here. It's right around the corner. Do we want this? Is this the world we want to live in?

Exactly. And as as we've been taught throughout our childhood and all the way up through school, expediency, safety, none of these things supersede the Constitution and the rights in this country that we have. So I want to move into some food conversations here, and there's a lot of great news happening out of Florida where else it's It always seems to be happening out of Florida. But we have the attorney general there who just held a press conference. Take a listen to this this morning.

We're here to announce that we have initiated an investigation into potassium bromate. It is a chemical compound, and it is an ingredient that is used in a lot of flowers and baked goods that are sold across the United States. It is also been linked to many forms of cancer. It is a possible carcinogen. It has been banned around most of the world. And unfortunately, here in the United States, it is likely still in the food that you at home eat. We will be issuing subpoenas to companies that do buy and sell products with potassium bromate in them. We will be starting with General Mills and their subsidiary Pillsbury. On the list will likely go on from there.

I'm actually watching people get sicker. I'm watching families having difficulties having babies. I'm watching kids get cancer. I'm watching cancer that was never seen before. Ages be seen. And so what we need to be doing is exactly what Florida is doing.

Our states have broad consumer protection authorities here in Florida. These subpoenas will be issued pursuant to our authorities under the, you know, Unfair and Deceptive Trade Practices Act.

That was fun to see. My good friend Ben Rall in there, great chiropractor, great activist out there in Florida. And in fact, just to not to get us too far off track, but I'm going to be in Orlando at an event he's putting on, I believe it's August 28th. There it is. 29th. Sorry, 29th. Uh, I'll be there most of the day. So definitely check that out if you're out there in that area. But what an amazing story. How ubiquitous is this product?

Well, it's, it's everywhere in the United States because we don't ban it here. California banned it, Utah banned it and school lunches for children. But otherwise it's free game. And like a lot of the chemicals that we talk about here are additives and contaminants. It has been looked at by the FDA since the 70s, so it needs a desperate reevaluation. And while we're waiting around for that, the attorney general in Florida is acting. And throughout the 80s, research, especially Japanese researchers, they knew that this was causing cancer and a dose response relationship. So the more you had, the more cancer it would cause in animal studies. So the International Agency on Research for cancer, iArc, they put out this in 1999 and said definitively this was carcinogen. And they said in rat to produce a renal, a renal tubular tumors, that's kidney cancer. Uh, carcinomas, it's, it's thyroid follicle tumors in animals of each sex and peritoneal mesotheliomas in males. And then it goes on in mice and hamsters similar similar situations to just cancer, kidney cancer. And that's where it stands. The US said, hey, no problem. Keep keep throwing it in the food and the bread. And it's a flour additive. It makes bread more appealing. It makes it stay on the shelf longer. It makes the dough thicker.

When the bread cooks, it makes it more appealing. It looks better. It looks browner. So obviously you can't test this in a study because you can't just go around and give kids this potassium bromate, and then have kids that don't eat potassium bromate and say, well, let's study this. So we have to look at studies like this that aren't animal studies. Looking at bakers. These are bakers in Central Africa. The researchers looked at just a bunch of people that are baking the bread with this potassium bromate in it. And you go into this study, and just a real quick caveat here are the this is from the study. And it just it just reminded people at the beginning of the study, hey, by the way, these are who banned this, this, this additive. You can see the European Union in 1990. They didn't even wait for the cancer agency to act. In 1999, United Kingdom, same thing. Nigeria, Canada, Sri Lanka, Brazil, Colombia. You can see China, Australia, New Zealand. A lot of people abandon this thing, not the United States. But it goes on in this research to talk about these bakers. And it says in the current study, all, every one of them, all the bakers have experienced symptoms of potassium bromate toxicity, which are indicative of oral and nasal exposure routes.

So they weren't eating the bread that their bacon just because of their cooking it and baking it in the steam in the kitchens. It's going in through it's it's aerosolizing and going into their lungs and their throats, and they're experiencing toxicity from that, which is incredible in this study. But then it goes on to look at the cancer incidences because we know from a dose dependent relationship, you don't want this in your body. And there's there's a very, very low limit, a bunch of zeros with a one in front of it that you should have. And so what they looked at is the limit you should have. And they also looked at how much bread people consume per day in this area. And they said this from the hazard ratios, the chances of having cancer from an average daily consumption of either simple bread, milk, bread or French bread, those are the breads they looked at in this study are approximately and they give some numbers here, 290,000 in 1,000,000 220,000 in 1,000,000, 180,000 a million. But we broke that down in a simple chart here. And if you go all the way to the right of this chart, here is your here is your incidences of cancer during a lifetime.

If you eat that bread, 29% chance, 22% chance. If you're eating the milk, bread, French bread, 19% chance. So basically about a about a quarter, about 25% chance average. If you eat bread during a lifetime, you're going to get cancer. 25% of people eating bread in that in that country from those bakers, according to this study, will get cancer, some type of cancer, most likely kidney cancer, according to the, you know, the catalogs of research we have on this already. So you're probably not going to want to wait for Florida to act on this. If you're in Florida, you can just do it right now and not have this stuff on your shelves. And we were going to put together a really nice infographic to show, well, here. Here are the products that you don't want to eat, you want to avoid, but there's so many of them. We just went to the Environmental Working Group's searchable list, because there's 681 products in the United States that have this potassium bromide in there. You can go to this search for your products that you regularly buy or what's on your shelf. And maybe if you want to decide to go a different direction, this could be your navigation, your compass to do that.

It's really, I mean, I don't know how many people out there in the audience, if you're watching right now, have you absolutely had it with seeing every other country that bans these things and finding out that America that is supposed to be the greatest nation in the world, is the last, always behind everyone else that we are being poisoned by government agencies. The FDA, you said, was it 1970s was the last time that they looked at this product, even while the rest of the world has recognized the cause of cancer? Let me guess. They can't do a human study because that would require actually giving this toxic poison that is killing rats to adults and children than those that don't get it, so they can't do a study. And so this is a kid do a study and say, well, we have no evidence that's rats. We have no evidence that this would happen. Human beings because we can't do a study. God, Sorry. I promised I'd be calm on this issue, but it just. It is so infuriating and so insane that in America, of all places.

Yeah, yeah, yeah. And so there's clearly a food additive and a chemical problem we have going on here. But there are some solutions, obviously. It starts at home, but there's a lawsuit now going through on a food product that doesn't have a label. That's strawberries. If you ever looked in the supermarket or in your fridge right now and you found a company, Driscoll Strawberries, one of the largest strawberry producers in the United States. Well, this is the website and I'm sorry, this is the headline. Driscoll strawberries contaminated with forever chemicals, lawsuit claims. And you go into this lawsuit. Now, a caveat on this. These are the conventional strawberries that are sold by this company, not the organic. Organic are governed by an entirely different labeling structure, which limits the amount of type of pesticides you can put on them. But you go into this into this lawsuit and it reads, this had plaintiff and consumers known the true facts concerning the strawberries, including the presence and or use of PFAs related compounds. Those are forever chemicals. They would not have purchased the products or would have paid significantly less for them. So that's that's what the lawsuit says. Now, I love.

That anybody is like, oh, this causes cancer. I'll buy it, but just reduce the price a little bit. I don't think anyone is thinking like that, but I get the point. All right.

Yeah. So anybody following this conversation throughout the years of contaminated fruits and vegetables with these pesticides and forever chemicals, they know that strawberries are the low hanging fruit, so to speak. So you can see this headline, over 90% of strawberries for the entire nation are grown in California. So when you see this headline by the Environmental Working group forever, chemicals contaminate nearly 40% of non-organic California grown produce. You can probably guess which way this is going to go. This lawsuit is a really great thing. It says 37% of non-organic or conventionally grown California produce samples had residue of pesticides that are forever chemicals known as PFAs. Strawberries contain ten individual PFAs pesticides, more variety than any other crop. So this Driscoll lawsuit is kicking down the door with the easiest target. If this door opens. You have so many other fruits cherries, peaches, a lot of other fruits are conventionally grown, are contaminated with these forever chemical pesticides. The EPA just released three more into the system. So this is a start of a legal battle that could turn this around really quick and hit the bottom, the margins of these suppliers. It's got some legs on it, and we're keeping an eye on that for sure.

It's getting really scary out there. I mean, we my wife and I have purchased Driscoll, but it's I think we tend to lean towards organic. Do we know if they're organic products are having this issue or is it mostly in the non-organic section?

It's all non-organic for.

The the non-organic. So so unfortunately for the people that aren't buying organic or don't even have that option. They're stored. They're being poisoned by where we get our vitamin C, where we get our antioxidants. These products are supposed to be there for our health. You really I mean, you're freaking me out this week. Jefferey. These are issues that just really. I think we're all so tired of it. And it's why, you know, we're hoping Robert Kennedy Jr can do something in there. But again, a lot of this is EPA right. Not necessarily under his jurisdiction. Fda is um you know, we're going to send this report to him and I'm going to personally say, uh, Bobby, can we get on top of this somehow? Anyway, uh, you, uh, let's just talk really quickly this Monday, this last Monday, you had the virgin voyage, um, of the download. So amazing. Getting great reviews. But what was it like? Show all there on your lonesome Jefferey.

So when we moved back here to Australia, I had to stay at home with him. I. Yes, I got you. Wow. My son was about 18 months old, and we noticed he progressively started slowing in his speech and social behaviors.

Where is she? Where is she? We had taken him to a pediatrician and in the process had realized that he was on the autism spectrum scale. We didn't know what that that was going to mean. So what I did was grabbed my guitar, learned a few cover tunes, made a few demo CDs, and and started going around to the pubs in Echuca trying to pick up some work on the weekend. I would love to stop playing in pubs. I'd love to start playing my own music.

This is the story of Tyler Hudson and his family.

Growing up in Pampa, Texas, I was a church kid, learned to play music in church band, and that just ignited a passion in me for music. Had a high school band. We traveled around and I had always had a fascination with adventure in Australia. Two weeks out of high school, I hopped on a plane and started studying music at a Bible college in Sydney. I fell in love with Australia, fell in love with the culture, and fell in love with a beautiful young Australian. Libby and I got married. We always wanted to be parents and so when Libby surprised me with the the magic wand telling me she was pregnant, we were thrilled. The pregnancy with lyric was totally normal. Other than the fact my wife legitimately wanted to name him Optimus Prime, and we compromised on lyric because I'm a musician. The closer to the birth that we came, the more excited we got. We just couldn't wait to be parents. And I remember day one, uh, with my son lyric in in my Arms, this precious little baby that. You can't believe that this is that you made this, this is half of half of me sitting here in this precious little human.

For the first year of his life, he was meeting all his milestones, laughing, giggling, crawling, began walking. At about nine months old, he began to start speaking, saying mom, dad, truck, cow. We went in for all of our checkups, received all of our vaccinations on schedule. So when we took lyric in for his 12 month checkup, that's when he received his MMR, pneumococcal and varicella vaccines all in the same day. That marks the beginning of when he stopped developing. The words that he had. Disappeared. He would no longer make eye contact with you. It was hard to get his attention. He'd look straight through you, just sitting, chewing on a stick, staring off into space. And he just seemed unsettled. By the time he was two, we clearly knew that something was indeed going wrong. We'd received the referral from our GP and she observed lyric in his natural environment, had a few tests that she conducted with him, she says. Oh yeah, he definitely has autism. And it's like a sledgehammer to the chest.

For the next few years. You're just taking it one doctor's appointment at a time, naively trying to get our son verbal so that he could go to school. Because you still don't understand the reality of profound autism. As I began doing my own research, I knew that the vaccine schedule aligned with our sons regression. He was still not speaking. He had severe gut dysfunction. So for the next few years of our lives, we just continued doctor's appointments, therapies, interventions, diets traveled all over the world, anything and everything, be it spiritually, medically, nutritionally, whatever, to to mitigate the struggles that he was facing, trying to produce a miracle for our son. And nothing's changed at all. The message being told to us was to stop striving and learn to be at peace. And that was devastating news for us because I had to let go of fighting. And I was actually ready to because I got I was tired of relating to my son as a as a problem to be fixed. And I just I had enough. I knew I was at a crossroads. I could go with plan A, unplug from society, disappear into the Tasmanian wilderness with my son, never be seen from again. Or plan B, I could try to change the conversation.

I could speak up. I could let my voice be represented because I wasn't hearing my perspective represented anywhere in the autism space. I'll lose followers over this one, but I don't care. It needs to be said. Autism awareness has become autism acceptance. Should the autism spectrum be split? Hell yeah. Being a parent of a profoundly autistic child, I mean, you deal with a lot of things, but the one constant is poop. One time I have shared a meltdown. I had people calling me names. I had people saying, oh, you shouldn't post that. You've got no problem. Me posting the cute little stories because it makes you feel good about oh, yay, we're accepting of autism. Are you accepting of autism? If you don't look at the shadow side that parents suffer with and deal with every day. Today is my 324th wedding. My son will be an adult and I'll have paid off my mortgage. If you're doing it tough, hang in there. I've had so many dark days, but today I'm really excited to get started in the season. We will look back on this time in history in 50 years, and it will be obvious what the cause of autism was. Come on, let's be brave and let's look for a cause.

A child that was non-verbal. Self-harming, um, requires significant support and slowly our experience has just been diluted out of the autism conversation because it's not a conversation society wants to have. Yeah. Because I believe that we are in denial about the autism epidemic and nobody wants to have the difficult conversations. So looking back on, on that package, I, I can see myself going through these stages of grief, denial, anger, bargaining, depression. And finally, when you arrive at acceptance, I just can't disengage from trying to make the world a better place for my daughters and their future children. And that's, that's why I decided to write the book because I, in 50 years time, I can't live with myself if I don't be truthful about our experience. And, and there's so many families out there that don't have the capacity to, to create a video or be online to try to have these conversations because they're, they're in the trenches dealing with children that are far worse off than, than mine. And so I just had to begin to speak up and, and let our perspective be heard.

It's been a long I mean, this first of all, this book is brilliantly written. Thank you. Um, it's, uh, it's rare to find someone that can so honestly share their experience. And I, if anyone is feeling abandoned right now in this autism journey that are, you know, have a child with the type of autism you're talking about and we'll get into, you know, I think this spectrum is so vast now there is a group that's being left behind. But even more than that, I think this book, it's like reading anything. It doesn't have to be my story. It's your journey through grief. Uh, it's a journey of empowerment. Give me the, you know, the ability to, to change the things that I can to accept the things that I cannot, which is just what we all grapple with in life. And you, we watch that in your family, your relationship with your wife. You're so honest. And there's other issues that come up in your life. But when we all go through difficult experiences, I have said, though, with the families I've spent, I don't know many that can compare to raising a child that is severely autistic. It is a 24 hour a day journey. What was the hardest part? If this is a journey of grief, or what is the moment that stands out as being one of the most difficult?

And you can only live in that state for so long before it just produces an insurmountable amount of angst in life. And that's part of that anger and bargaining stages of grief. It just I describe them as these spinning plates. You just keep denial, anger, bargaining, all of them spinning at the same time. If you let go of any one of those things, your whole life just comes crashing down.

How does he function in society that he will require significant support for life? And, and that was probably the most significant portion of our grief journey was, was the acceptance and the depression of what of what came with that?

It's not working. I'm trying that. What is that journey like? Especially, I think in men, men tend to leave in these situations because we're fixers and once we feel like we can't fix it. Yeah, the sense of failure overcomes us. And many mothers are left with the autistic child alone. So good on you for staying in there.

Well, that that journey is very real and I for me, that manifested in itself that I didn't feel like a good dad because I couldn't solve the problem. After years and years and years, none of these miracle cures worked for us. I'm so glad that they've worked for other people, but at the end of the day, I, my son, didn't need a mentor. He needed a carer. And that role typically falls to a mom, particularly in the in the earlier years. And so I chased significance. And the only profession that didn't confront me with my, um, my inadequacy and I just worked, I threw myself into work and said, well, whatever the future holds, we're going to need more money. So, sweetheart, you got the kids. I'll go, I'll go take care of the money. And it nearly cost me my marriage, that season of grief for us. And these are conversations that we don't have in the autism space because they're too confronting. Society doesn't want to talk about them. I got a comment this morning. Um, the term cure was used and they said, please don't use the term cure. And I was like. Okay, fine. How about bringing order to disorder? How about lessening someone's struggles? Even the word cure is offensive. And the autistic community has done such a good job of creating awareness and creating inclusion that it now becomes about policing the words that we use in order to talk about lessening someone's struggles.

And when you get a little bit older and you look at it generationally and you're starting to look at things in the time timeline of decades, you think, why would we want to suppress information that could help limit the prevalence of autism for the future? Yes, there's a genetic component, but genetics is just the rug of mystery that everything we don't understand gets swept under. Lung cancer was once solely genetic. In 50 years time, I believe it will be self-evident what contributed to the causes of autism in our society today. Not for everyone, but that that leads itself to greater distinction in the spectrum as well. It's very possible my my child doesn't have autism. He has symptoms from a vaccine injury that are identified as autism. It it may not be autism. We don't know because there's less and less clarity in the spectrum. And that all of these voices, it's a cacophony of chaos at the moment. And we need greater distinction so that we might limit this condition for future generations by by mitigating their exposure to factors that contribute to autism.

I want to just to speak to sort of what happens when you're trying to have a conversation, how nuanced is being forced to be? This is Robert Kennedy Jr. As HHS secretary.

I thought, surely she'll help calm the storm and say, this is just dirty old politics. But instead she shared an article that said, keep my son's name out your mouth. And she was furious that RFK was suggesting autism was a problem that needed solving. And I'm like the I can't believe this is the world we're living in. And I was this close to just unplugging and disappearing into the wilderness. And I thought, I cannot let my girls raise their future children in this society that is so backwards and twisted and is is not looking at those most profoundly affected and looking to help those kids. But we're more worried about offending those with higher function. And that's where the it is a minefield trying to navigate this spectrum and advocacy, because we want to celebrate people with autism and that absolutely we can. But we conflate that with celebrating the disorder itself. And autism becomes a superpower.

He's the happiest boy. Just let him be. But he's not the one choking on grief. It's me. It feels like they want him frozen, some untouched art, but I want him living with a voice and a heart. I want him sneaking out, yelling at games, kissing lips, not trapped in routines and medicine scripts. To fall in love. To drive. To speak and be understood. If I could cure him, I swear to God I would not because I don't love him, but because I do.

So we submitted four requests on behalf of ICAN in 2023 for, uh, documents related to. It was many years ago, documents related to these internal discussions regarding Covid vaccines, Covid vaccine injuries, right after the Covid vaccine rolled out. Um, so that was in 2023. Those FOIA requests went ignored. So in 2025, again, on behalf of ICAN, we brought we brought a lawsuit to produce those documents. And on your screen is a copy of that complaint that was brought on behalf of ICAN. So the documents that have recently been produced have been extensive. So we've learned a tremendous amount from these emails that were exchanged from top officials at NIH right after the rollout of the vaccine. And it's been profound what we learned.

What are some of the I mean, what's the totality of these emails? What story is it painting right now as we look at this?

Sure. I would say the biggest kind of overall revelation that we learned from these emails is that top senior officials at NIH leadership were discussing reports of very serious neurological symptoms and injuries from the Covid vaccine, or that appeared right after the Covid vaccine very early on after the vaccine rollout, while at the same time, they were having internal discussions about how pursuit of that information and following up in those reports could actually increase vaccine hesitancy and what they were calling a social media overreaction. So what struck me, though, is that these were not hypothetical discussions in the emails. These were reports from a senior neurologist who was documenting very serious neurological conditions in dozens of patients. Dozens. And we're talking conditions like pots like symptoms, transverse myelitis, other neurological conditions.

They were one of them. Here's one of them. This is Dear Walter. Please see attached manuscript format as a letter based on experience of neuropathy like symptoms in 24 patients. The main message is that early recognition and treatment with corticosteroids can reverse the symptoms, although some will spontaneously get better. Are several over several weeks. Please let me know. That one right there really enraged me because we worked so closely with react 19. And you know, all of the, you know, Bree dress in there. And all of these people have been injured and they're all describing this neuropathy that they've been getting gas lit by the FDA even. And she was in the trials. And to think that they are seeing that with their own eyes. They're talking you've got Francis Collins involved here. You've got Tony Fauci, and they're like, you know what? Instead of, you know, taking care of these people instead of presenting what we know could be a cure to their injury, let their lives be destroyed so that we don't hurt the confidence in this product. Am I am I overstating that?

I think that's pretty close to I mean, what we saw from these emails was the concern was more about the public perception. Would this increase or decrease rather? Um, you know, uptake of the vaccine? Would people be hesitant to get the vaccine after learning about this? And in fact, Nath actually says in one of the emails that his primary concern and his primary purpose in putting together this report that he was trying to get published was actually to help these patients with different early treatments. So one can speculate what might have happened had this report been taken seriously. But the discussions that we see through these emails really concern the vaccine hesitancy. They're concerned about social media overreaction. And it's interesting, though, because as we know, the, the public story, um, you know, the public messaging that was being pushed at the time, very different from what was actually being discussed and what was known internally at the time.

I mean, I think about, let's bring up this email that just popped up. This is another one that was really shocking. It's coming now. Here we go. So this is Francis Collins, the head of NIH. Hi, Walter. I find this approach very troubling. There's truly the risk of a cause and effect, serious adverse neurological event. That's important to discover. But collecting anecdotes and then trying to build a case isn't scientifically compelling, and we'll have the main consequence of feeding vaccine hesitancy and social media overreaction, which is exactly what you said. But when I read this, I thought about the fact that they skipped the safety trials. The emergency use authorization meant they left the safety trials. So we were going to get no long term review, really virtually about a week or two after the second shot was given. So we have no safety evaluation. And under those circumstances, in my understanding of how pharmaceutical testing should work, it's not, you know, innocent until proven guilty. You are using people as test subjects. The opposite is true. You must assume that any side effect you are seeing is caused by this product until you can prove otherwise. And so Francis Collins is living in this, you know, fairy tale world where he what is he going to say to a million of these to be verified against placebo trials? You are using these on innocent people and forcing them through the Biden administration to take them. And when you see these signals, the way he shuts it down because vaccine hesitancy is his concern. Here's the response to that email. This is from Tabak Lawrence. I thought it was me. I don't understand why Walter does not shut this down. Meaning, I totally agree. Why are we even, you know, embracing this thought? Let them fry. Basically, the greater good of vaccinating everybody is what's important here. I know I'm putting I'm putting a creative spin on it. So let me be careful because you're an attorney. But I think it's very clear what's being written there. What are your thoughts when you read this from a legal perspective?

Sure. I mean, what we see here is again, public messaging versus what the truth actually was, what they knew and what and when they knew it. So we know that very early on these reports were coming out. The concern wasn't the actual symptoms themselves. The concern wasn't investigating this. The concern wasn't public safety. The impression from these emails, the concern was vaccine hesitancy. And again, social media overreaction. I mean, the broader story here really isn't about the neurological conditions. It's about transparency. So what we were able to obtain from these emails is we know that what they were saying publicly did not match up with their internal knowledge at the time. Um, and public confidence has to be there. Our government agencies are responsible for pursuing scientific inquiry. Public has to be able to trust that the government is acting in their best interests. These emails tell a different story.

I mean, from where I see it, if if I can had not brought this lawsuit. I don't think the public would have ever, um, come aware of these emails. I don't think this information would have ever been made public. We now know that senior NIH officials very early on knew about very serious neurological conditions. We know that their concern upon hearing about those was vaccine hesitancy, social media overreaction. I mean, this is a very serious kind of trove of emails that we have, and they're still being still being produced. But that's exactly why the Freedom of Information Act exists. So public deserves to know what is going on in these agencies. They deserve to know, uh, the, the discussions that are being had, how these decisions are being made on their behalf. Um, and whether somebody ultimately agrees or doesn't agree with the outcome of those conclusions. You know, transparency is key here and ICANN's litigation made that possible in this case.
